
'Duck's dinner'

Teacher notes: Water birds do not use knives, forks, chopsticks or their fingers to eat. They have bills or beaks that come in lots of different shapes and sizes to exploit different food items in different habitats.





So, water birds avoid comptetition between various species by feeding on different food items from different parts of the water body or adjacent land.



Make a birdy bag containing human tools that do the same jobs as different bird beaks. The birdy bag might include nutcrackers (for seeds); meat hook (bird of pray), tea strainer (flamingo), tweezers any small insect-eating bird), chopsticks (wader).



Display the tools. Ask to your pupils to foresee what sort of food items can be reached.
