


to make a shade you add Black!




to make a tint you add white!

The foreground darker, the background lighter


Objects in the distance appear pale.

cool colors recede


In this landscape by Claude Monet, we see the blue sky receding, and the yellow flowered fields advancing.


Artists use warm, cool and neutral colours to create moods, show contrast and create depth in artworks.

 Cool colours can even make you feel cooler






